1) Apologies for Absence: None

2) Notes of previous meetings: 26th July 2011 (attached to agenda)
Agreed

3) Update on the position of the Draft Interim Statement and Statement of Community Involvement (oral update)

Officers confirmed the decision at Council on 7th September to abandon the Draft Interim Statement approach and continue to move forward with the Core Strategy Review. Members were also advised that the Statement of Community Involvement was adopted on 23rd September; copies of which are available to view at all libraries. All statutory consultees, including Parish and Neighbourhood Councils were advised of the adoption.

4) Horsham District Plan Timetable (oral update)

Members were advised that the Core Strategy Review will now be called the Horsham District Planning Framework. It is proposed that the first stage of consultation will be early 2012. The main focus of the document will be setting local housing need targets. The document will also identify areas of policy such as renewable energy which will be reviewed and updated. The second stage of consultation is proposed for summer 2012; this document will be the Council's preferred strategy including identifying sites to deliver the strategy. The Government encourage that as few documents as possible are produced. As a result the Horsham District Planning Framework will include Core Policies in Part 1 and Development Management Policies in Part 2.

5) National Planning Policy Framework Draft response and response to Local Planning Regulations consultation (oral presentation)

Members will be sent a copy of the final response for comment, before it is submitted to central Government by the 17th October. A summary of points raised by Officers are as follows:

- General support for the approach to review the National policy/guidance and recognise the need to simplify however this needs to be done carefully to meet the objectives.
- Agree with the description of sustainable development, it is a balanced approach and the presumption in favour of sustainable development is not a new concept. It is one which this Council has embraced.
- Concerns were raised as to the balance through the document of environmental, social and economic issues.

- Support the plan led approach focus. The planning system should ensure that plans continue to give certainty to communities and properly plan for areas and there is concern that the currently drafted document may not give this.
- Concerned about the lack of checks in numerous areas of the framework which is due to a lack of detail and very generic policy statements.
- Concern around the removal of very recently adopted PPS's such as PPS4 regarding the historic environment. Including the loss of detailed guidance in PPG & PPS's such as the sequential test guidance for flooding, noise limits for environmental health.
- There is confusion as to whether there will be other policy. There has been recognition that guidance to sit alongside the document will be needed.
- Concern about the NPPF being silent on brownfield development focus, may impact when developers bring forward greenfield sites rather than brownfield allocations.
- Concern regarding the 'when the plan is silent, indeterminate or policies out of date' grant permission. This will not necessarily achieve the aims of sustainable development and leads to uncertainty when the Government are promoting a plan-led approach.
- It is considered that in the Core Planning Principles section lacks reference to localism.
- Concern as to the lack of focus on 'spatial planning' more focused around land use, tying in plans with other relevant strategies and programmes.
- Concern as to the lack of recognition and protection of areas without a national designation.
- Concern about the steer not to protect employment land, considering longer terms needs and competing land uses.
- Concern as to the implication of authorities setting CIL appropriately 'throughout the economic cycle' as this could mean in the future CIL levels are too low and infrastructure is not able to be delivered.
- Concern that a full Sustainability Appraisal has not been undertaken of the document, setting policy. Equalities Impact Assessment not undertaken. Health Impact Assessment not undertaken.
- Suggestion that there needs to be clear transitional arrangements as well as detailed information on subsequent guidance/ advice areas to be produced alongside the framework to ensure the desired aims are realised from this change at the national level. Lack of this could lead to lack of direction in planning and it being led by appeals. This will not necessarily achieve the aims of sustainable development and leads to uncertainty when the Government are promoting a plan-led approach.

Officers set out at a recent conference which MP Bob Neill attended, the Government clearly recognise that it will have to work closely with planning professionals to 'fine tune' the National Planning Policy Framework and that further guidance will be needed alongside the document as well as transitional guidance. Detailed comments are being prepared taking into account comments from Members, Development Management Officers, Specialist

Officers in landscape and historic environment as well as Environmental Health.

Members questioned the loss of details currently contained in Government documents. Officers clarified that they agree with much of the document however as highlighted there are some concerns, including concern as to the loss of some detail, for example the loss of guidance for the sequential test for flooding and noise levels for environmental health contained in current Planning Policy Statements and Guidance.

Members also expressed concern regarding 'when a plan is silent or indeterminate'. Officers set out that some may consider that all plans are 'out-of-date' when there is a change to higher level policy. It is important to have transitional guidance put in place and arrange with PINS and Local Authorities to ensure the aims of the change in planning is implemented smoothly and as envisaged.

Officers also highlighted the consultation on the Local Planning Regulations, which close on the 7th October. The Council is also formulating a response to this consultation which will be made available on the Council's website.

6) Response from the Green Infrastructure Stakeholder consultation (report attached to agenda)

On the 26th July Officers presented the Green Infrastructure Visioning document to Members. The Visioning document is the first stage in the preparation of a Green Infrastructure Strategy for the Horsham District. The document will map, plan and identify a coherent network of green spaces across the District and mechanisms to ensure its delivery. It will assist the Council across many functions, including leisure service and will inform the production of an Open Space Strategy. It will also form part of the evidence base which feeds into the review of the Core Strategy. Full details of which are given within the report. It is anticipated that a Green Infrastructure Geographical Information System (GIS) tool and Draft Final Green Infrastructure report be completed by the end of 2011.

Members disagreed with the term 'Long Distance Recreational Routes' as stated in paragraph 1.5 of the report; it was felt that the titles of footpaths and bridleways should be left as they are as considered clearer than the alternative. Comments were noted by Officers.

7) Local Development Framework Update (oral update)

Officers gave an oral presentation on a number of aspects of the current work on the LDF and its component Local Development Documents, including:

- **Localism Bill Update**

The Bill is currently in the final stages of discussion in the House of Lords. Officers will advise Members of progress of the Bill.

- **Horsham Town Plan**

The Draft Horsham Town Plan has been approved for a six week consultation which will commence on the 28th October 2011. Kathryn Reeves, Senior Planning Officer is the lead Officer for this document.

- **Settlement Sustainability Work**

Catherine Howe, Senior Environmental Officer explained that Officers are currently undertaking a review of the existing document which assesses settlement sustainability. It was explained that the District will be looked at as a whole; investigating different lifestyles and collecting data on areas such as retail and transport. Officers will contact all Parish and Neighbourhood Councils to seek their clarification and local knowledge on data collated.

- **Landscape Capacity Work**

The Landscape Character Assessment 2003 is currently being reviewed. The 2003 document provided a description for each area and is the basis for policy CP1 of the adopted Core Strategy. Matthew Bright, Landscape Architect for the Council is currently bringing the document up to date considering impact of large and small scale development. A final copy should be complete by the end of the year.

- **Gypsies, Travellers & Travelling Showpeople Site Assessment**

Consultants, Baker Associates were commissioned earlier this year to carry out a site assessment for Horsham District. The final report is expected to be received Mid October. A full report will be presented to SPAG on the 8th November.

- **S106 Work with Parish Councils**

Tom Crowley e-mailed all Parish and Neighbourhood Councils to ask them to provide Horsham District Council will information in relation to future projects for which, if development were to come forward, they would seek to secure S106 funding. Members were advised that there have been a few applications where the Council have been unable to obtain funds for the settlement due to a lack of an evidence base. The information is being collated so that Development Management Officers can refer to the database while dealing with applications and also allow them to update it when working with Parish and Neighbourhood Councils. To date, only a few Parish/Neighbourhood Councils have responded. As a result a reminder from Tom Crowley has been sent. Members were asked to encourage their Parish/Neighbourhood Council to provide Horsham District Council with their details.

The Cabinet Member for Living and Working Communities reinforced Officer comments in relation to S106 work. Members agreed to discuss this issue with their Parish/Neighbourhood Council.

National Planning Policy Framework and Local Planning Regulations Response

1. National Planning Policy Framework Consultation Response

- 1.1 The Government published the National Planning Policy Framework for consultation on the 25th July 2011. The consultation was open to all and ran until 17th October 2011.
- 1.2 As set out and discussed at previous Strategic Planning Advisory Group meetings, the Government aims to simplify the planning process, reducing the volume of National Planning Policy from some 1000 pages which they consider has become far too complex and inaccessible. The Government has committed to produce one clear, tightly focused document, setting out national priorities only where necessary to do so. This being a key part of the proposed reforms aimed at getting the planning system right for current and future generations and to promote sustainable growth.
- 1.3 The Government encouraged all to read and comment on the draft National Planning Policy Framework and submit comments by the 17th October. The Council carefully considered the document and prepared comments which can be viewed on the Council's website, the link set out below. A link to these comments, sent to all Members, Parish and Neighbourhood Council's,
- 1.4 These comments took into account comments from Members, including through discussions at this group, Development Management, Specialist Officers in Development Management, Individuals in the Strategic Planning Team and a meeting was held with Environmental Health.
- 1.5 The comments set out that;

“Horsham District Council is generally supportive of the approach to ‘refresh’ and simplify national planning guidance. We also support the objective of simplifying the planning process and the focus on sustainable development. We agree that economic needs are a priority but that these should be balanced with the environmental and social elements of sustainable development.

An overall key concern is the lack of clear parameters in numerous areas of the Framework which is due to a lack of detail and very generic policy statements. In particular, we are concerned about the removal of Planning Policy Guidance (PPG) and Planning Policy Statement's (PPS) such as PPS4, PPG13, PPS23 PPG24 and PPS25, especially those more recently published. Some sections of this existing Government guidance help to measure the suitability of development proposals as well as assess other areas including public health violations such as noise and land instability.

They also provide detailed guidance on the sequential test for flooding. There is concern about the creation of a policy vacuum by the removal of some of these detailed PPG/PPS's and their appendices. The NPPF consultation document infers that there will be further publications but it is not clear whether other policy/ guidance will be produced. This needs to be clarified with a list of areas to be covered and could allay many concerns.

As a predominately rural District with a number of market towns this Council is concerned that the NPPF is silent on a focus for brownfield development. This may result in developers bringing forward greenfield sites rather than brownfield allocations.

We are concerned that a full Strategic Environmental Assessment has not been undertaken of the document, which sets policy, as required by European Legislation of plans, policies and programmes. Also, that an Equalities Impact Assessment and Health Impact Assessment do not appear to have been undertaken.

There is also concern about the lack of focus on 'spatial planning'. The Draft NPPF focuses around land use tying in plans with other relevant strategies and programmes.

We consider that transitional arrangements need to be set out as well as detailed information on subsequent guidance/ advice areas to be produced alongside the framework to ensure the desired aims are realised from this change at the national level. An absence of transition arrangement could lead to a lack of direction in planning and it being led by the reactive appeal process rather than being plan-led. This will not necessarily achieve the aims of sustainable development and leads to uncertainty for communities and service providers.

We support the comments of the Planning Officers Society and the work it is doing with the Government on the National Planning Policy Framework."

2. Local Planning Regulations Consultation Response

- 2.0 A further consultation was also published on the Local Planning Regulations, the closing date for this being the 7th October. This sort views on the Governments proposed new regulations governing the process by which local councils prepare their development plan and associated documents. The Council has again contributed to this consultation by submitting comments.
- 2.1 The response sets out that the "*Council welcomes the consolidation of the changes since 2004 into a single document, while revising the remaining regulations in order to ensure that they are as effective and as simple as possible. Increasing the discretion available to Local Planning Authorities in the production of documents was also welcomed*". Further detailed comments were made on sections of the document which can also be viewed on the weblink below.

Draft Gatwick Masterplan: Consultation

1. Gatwick Airport became independent in December 2009 and the last published masterplan was five years ago, under the previous ownership of BAA. Since the new ownership, the central focus for Gatwick has been on improving the passenger journey to, through and from the airport. The draft masterplan, published for consultation from 13th October 2011 to 13th January 2011, sets out their vision for the airport in 2020.
2. Over the time period to 2020, the airport is seeking to grow the number of passengers to a throughput of 40 million per annum; based on a single runway. To help achieve this the airport identifies six strategic priorities:
 - *Deliver the best passenger experience*
 - *Help our airlines grow*
 - *Increase value and efficiency*
 - *Protect and enhance our reputation*
 - *Build a strong environment, health and safety culture*
 - *Develop the best people, processes and technology*
3. The airport has already started an investment programme, which includes the expansion of the North Terminal, a new inter-terminal shuttle and various internal works, and this will continue.
4. The draft masterplan looks forward to 2020 and making the best use of the single runway to increase passengers to 40 million per annum. The airport believes this can be achieved without any significant change to the airport's size, but through changes to the airport infrastructure.

5. Whilst seeking this growth, the airport '*...will make every effort to maintain, and, where possible, improve the sustainability of our operations.*' As part of the sustainable growth, the draft masterplan makes reference to the '*Decade of Change*' document published in 2010, which outlines how they will seek to improve the sustainability of the airport by:

- *Reducing our direct carbon emissions by 50% compared to 1990 levels*
- *Cutting our energy consumption by 20% compared to 1990 levels*
- *Improving the way we mitigate airport related noise through implementing our 'Noise Action Plan'*
- *Eliminating the use of all landfill waste sites and ensuring that 70% of all the waste we generate is recycled*
- *Investing in new infrastructure that will improve the quality of water leaving the airport site*
- *Managing the impact of our operations on local air quality*
- *Enhancing the £2 billion contribution we make to the UK economy through the 23,000 jobs we generate on-site*
- *Promoting more sustainable surface access to the airport*

6. The draft masterplan also looks further ahead to 2030 and the possibility of handling around 45 million passengers. On one runway, this could be achieved with further infrastructure upgrades, but the airport would be operating at full capacity.

7. Regarding a second runway, the draft masterplan states that:

'We have no current plans for a second runway at Gatwick.'

8. However, the airport will continue to safeguard land for future expansion because they believe it is sensible business practice and to cater for all eventualities in the longer term.

Next Steps

11. Horsham District Council is a member of GATCOM (Gatwick Airport Consultative Committee) and this offers the opportunity to comment jointly with other local authorities and stakeholders on the draft masterplan. This Council may also wish to submit views separately. An initial response is being prepared and will be influenced by discussions at this meeting of the SPAG. This initial response will need to be submitted to GATCOM by 2nd December in order for it to be incorporated in the joint response. Strategic Planning would therefore welcome any views on the draft masterplan at this meeting or following the meeting, by 17th November, in order for those views to be incorporated into the Council's response.
